



During the summer months, the popular Kingsbridge Jazz Club repairs to Long Easton in Bigbury with stunning views over the rolling hills of the South Hams countryside. For once the weather did not disappoint, and it was a calm and still afternoon as we walked through a wildflower meadow to hear the blissful sounds of The Drat Pack warming up. Summer was here at last!

The set opened with some well-known classics: Cole Porter's Pennies From Heaven, Frank Sinatra's I've Got You Under My Skin, and then Feeling Good, memorably sung by the great Nina Simone. It wasn't long before the terrace



came alive with a masterclass of swing and lindy hop from Duncan and Louise. It was a joy to watch their faultless footwork, and their infectious love of dancing inspired some couples to join them on the dance floor. making full use of the large space on the upper garden terrace was definitely Adam's comfortable milieu and the sunlit-bathed audience clearly warmed to him. The band romped through an effervescent set list consisting of jazz, swing and even some popular songs from more recent times. They were joined by the dancing couple Duncan and Louise who started up the Plymouth based dance school Mad About Swing in 2007 and are regularly seen on the dance floor at a variety of locations.

One after one came some classic jazz dance numbers, including Love Is The Tender Trap, Autumn Leaves, Mr Bojangles, It Don't Mean A Thing and Paper Moon, all covered at various times by Frank Sinatra, Nat King Cole, Ella Fitzgerald and Duke Ellington, as the first set came to a close. More classic swing followed in the second half, with songs such as Route 66, Hit The Road Jack, and Minnie The Moocher, that rumbustiously memorable number from Cab Calloway. There was also time for the audience to join in some of the choruses as a joyful afternoon came to a close. We look forward to the next outdoor event, at Long Easton, on Sunday 4 August featuring the Carlton Big Band and the vocalist Andy Youngs.

#### Bigbury History Society Totnes Town Walk

Thursday 4th July was an unusually bright day for the election - and the Totnes town walk by BHS members. We were met mid morning at the Market Square by Kathy, our guide from the Totnes Civic Society, with the objective of learning more of the town's activities and buildings over the ages.

This began with an explanation of its Saxon roots, and the Norman "take over" with the building of the famous Motte and Bailey castle. We walked around the old stone walls, taking in The Guildhall, the Museum and finally the Church.

Apart from the many influences and changes over time perhaps the most interesting was that, during the Civil War (when most of the South Hams supported the Royalist cause) Totnes did not take sides. Rather it supported whichever army came to town, which probably resulted in the many Tudor buildings not being destroyed - and remaining for our For your diary the next BHS meeting is a trip to Shilston on 11th September. On the 4th October there is A Talk on "Bells, Bellringing and Bigbury" at The Memorial Hall and on the 14th BHS has arranged a Town Walk by Salcombe Museum. 



With much gratitude, joy and love in Christ.







### agathe Christie



Agatha in 1931

Agatha Christie was an English writer well known for her 66 fictional novels and 14 short stories. Christie was born into an upper middle class family in Torquay on the 5th September 1890, and was raised with her two older siblings and parents. Christie always had a love for writing, teaching herself to read by the age of five while being home schooled by her mother.

At 16 she moved to Paris to study vocals and piano, however she was shy, therefore lacking the confidence to perform. At 18 she started writing short stories while ill with influenza, married Archibald Christie in 1914 but did not publish her first official book 'The Mysterious Affair at Styles' until 1920 after writing it st a dare from her sister in 1916. Over the years Christie published more and more books, using her knowledge from working as an apothecary's assistant throughout her novels.

Over the years Christie had a child, however her marriage fell apart when her husband revealed he was having an affair. This caused Christie to disappear for 11 days after an argument, only to be found checking into Swan Hydro Hotel in Harrogate under the last name of her husband's mistress with no recollection of the days she was missing.

Christie remarried to a man named Max Mallowan, an archeologist who she travelled with and picked up her many hobbies and favourite things such as archeology, travelling and surfing (she learnt while in South Africa and Hawaii) and swimming, perfect for the south west waters!



In 1929 Burgh Island Hotel was built by Archie Nettlefold who Christie knew through his financial backing of several London stage productions. This is where Christie's long history with Burgh Island began. Burgh Island is often associated with her as she used the island and hotel as setting and inspiration for her two famous novels 'And Then There Were None' and 'Evil Under The Sun'.



Christie fell in love with the island's charm and romantic isolation. She was a regular guest as it was inspiring and peaceful, therefore taking long retreats to relax and work on her novels. She saw the hotel as a second home, even having her own private writer's retreat built for her, now commonly known as 'The Beach House' Another room in the hotel was also named after her: 'The Christie Room'. The hotel often host murder mystery events with an Agatha Christie theme where guests can dress in period costumes!

There have been many TV adaptations, films and documentaries on Christie's plays and novels that use the island as a filming location such as the 2001 TV adaptation of 'Evil Under the Sun' and scenes from the BBC 1987 dramatisation of Christie's story Nemesis.


Her most famous play, 'The Mouse Trap' is the longest running play in the world, having debuted in 1952, every day Christie's name has appeared in every news paper with a West End theatre listing (with exception of 2020 lockdown). Therefore, the island proudly celebrates her life and achievements as she found such comfort and inspiration from a place so well known in the community.

Agatha Christie lived out her last few years with her husband Max and died of natural causes in Winterbrook House at 85 years old. You can visit her summer house, Greenway, in Devon, which is now owned by the National Trust, and stay in the two rooms named famously after the writer herself.

With more than two billion books sold, she is only outsold by Shakespeare and the Bible, making Agatha Christie one of the best selling fiction authors ever.

Kim Watkins, also known as Random Stuff, has been a full-time artist for over 10 years, she didn't start out life doing that and spent many years as a staff nurse before leaving the health service to bring up her daughters in Kingston. She has lived there, with her husband and a variety of animals since 1994 and is happier there, than anywhere else in the world. She also spent 13 happy years as a Teaching assistant at Modbury School, but after becoming ill, both mentally and physically, whilst recovering, she re-evaluated and became a full-time artist, a decision that she has never regretted as she has a passion for what she does and has discovered that many of her customers feel the same!

Kim now works virtually every day in a lovely little shed in her garden, a place of inspiration and creativity. She is also part of a new collective of makers and collectors in Modbury, called Fourteen A, where you will find a selection of her work and 2025 calendar.



As well as creating pictures, she has also designed and makes a large range of brooches, made from cereal boxes with only the pin on the back being new, no two are the same. Her journals and notebooks are made using a huge array of pre-loved papers and have proved to be incredibly popular. Kim's work has featured at Delamore Arts for the last two years, she is a member of South Hams Art Forum (SHAF) and displays her work at various events.



She is a member of the Association of British Naïve artists and creates beautiful, unique pictures using recycled paper and sews them together on her sewing machine. Each naïve creation contains engaging and nostalgic materials, rescued from a large variety of sources; each piece is therefore, not just a visual narrative but also tells a story through the materials she has used. Kim has always recycled things and hates waste and enjoys the fact that she is using other people's rubbish in a fun and wacky way! She takes inspiration from all-around her, and it satisfies her inner Womble!



In the winter and spring, Kim will again host workshops, where people get the opportunity to learn new skills, have some special time for themselves and leave with their own creation. # Village Kitchen

# INGREDIENTS (most of the ingredients can be found in Helmuell Stores)

(most of the ingredients can be found in Holywell Stores) 750g Charlotte potatoes, halved lengthways

Olive oil

1 red onion, cut into wedges

- 1 bulb of garlic, separated into cloves
- 1 lemon, cut into wedges
- 8 whole chicken thighs
- 12 baby plum tomatoes, halved

Small glass of white wine

Handful of green and a handful of kalamata olives

100g feta cheese sliced

Handful of oregano leaves (or a dessert spoon of dried oregano)



#### **METHOD**

Heat the oven to 200c (fan oven) or 180c (gas oven). Put the potatoes in a large roasting tray, add 2 tbsp of olive oil and season.

Roast for 20 mins and toss half way.

Add the red onion, garlic cloves, lemon wedges and chicken, drizzle with another tbsp olive oil and season.

Roast for another 20 mins.

Add the tomatoes, wine and olives and put the tray back in the oven at a higher heat of 220c (fan) 200c (gas) for a further 20 mins.

The chicken should now be nice and crispy and golden.

Sprinkle over the feta cheese and oregano and drizzle with a little more olive oil to serve.

# Garden Gate State Contraction

#### **GARDENING IN AUGUST AND SEPTEMBER**

As in previous summer months, the main task is to make your favourite brew or tipple and sit in the best spot to enjoy your garden. When you feel a burst of energy, here are some jobs to do until it's time to sit down again.

#### **AUGUST**



Harvest fresh herbs to freeze in ice cubes for winter use, or to hang up and dry, then store in jars.

Remove the lower leaves of cordon tomatoes up to the lowest truss for more air and light to get to the fruits.

Summer prune apple trees to encourage good fruiting in the future.

Look out for signs of tomato and potato blight, removing affected crops fast to reduce spread.

Prune lavender once flowering is over to maintain a compact, bushy shape, but avoid cutting into old wood.

Cut off excess strawberry runners and replant to improve and promote growth.

Feed containers and border perennials with a liquid tomato food weekly to encourage them to bloom into the early autumn.

Collect and sow seed from perennials and hardy annuals to grow from seed. It is straightforward and increases the number of plants in your garden for free.

Divide perennials regularly to ensure healthy, vigorous plants that will continue to perform year after year. It also offers the opportunity to multiply your plants.

After cutting mini-meadows, rake off and remove the clippings to avoid it smothering delicate plants and increase fertility which encourages growth at the expense of wildflowers.

#### SEPTEMBER



Net ponds before leaves fall and decompose in the water over winter, reducing water oxygen levels.

Feed bare soil with green manures to smother weeds and prevent soil erosion.

Top up the late summer colour by adding some echinacea, lavender or digitalis in flower to attract bees, butterflies and insects.

Start sowing hardy annuals, like cornflowers, cerinthes and scabiosa so they will begin to flower in the early summer next year.

Collect ripe seeds from your favourite flowers and store in labelled envelopes, ready to sow in spring.

Fill any gaps with late-flowering perennials, such as sedums, to provide nectar for pollinating insects into autumn.

Leave sunflower seed heads in place for birds to feed on.

Lift gladioli corms, dry them off, then store in a frost-free shed or garage over winter.

Pick apples and pears before the wind blows them down, and store undamaged fruits if you can't eat them fresh.

September is the start of the planting season for spring bulbs. Planting in September will ensure that they can set out roots before the soil becomes too wet.

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# Farm Gate

#### MOUNT FOLLY FARM

Mount folly farm is a family business in Bigbury, run by the Case and Tucker family, who have been farming for over a hundred years. They have 650 acres of farm land. This is used to hold the livestock such as 50 suckler cows and 700 ewes, and produce such as cauliflower and spring beans. It is a very mixed farm, therefore has a wide range of produce from beef to cabbages.



They have installed 45kw of solar panels, stored over 100,000 litres of rain water, reinstalled hedgerows, planted 100s of trees and changed their grazing system to paddock grazing. This produces more organic matter in order to be as environmentally friendly as possible. farming organically and sustainably. To ensure the produce is the best quality, it has to be stored correctly to keep fresh as it is organic and therefore could deteriorate quickly. Some vegetables such as spring greens and curly kale need to be sold the same day as they were picked!





Now is the time of year they are planting the last of their vegetables such as cauliflower and calabrese, as well as harvesting kohlrabi and savoy cabbages. However, this time of year it is challenging with the weather, cash flow and enough staff. Therefore, they have to remain flexible to cope with constant challenges and changes.

On the average day, there are around 10-12 people working on the farm but if necessary contract workers can be called in to help.





In these summery months, everyone on the farm is looking forward to some warm weather. They want to be getting all the vegetables planted correctly with all plans in place, ready for next year so they can have a short, well deserved rest in August before they start harvesting again.

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
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### Business Matters

### Dedicated to our Young Upcoming Entrepreneurs It's all About



As part of a work experience opportunity enabled by Bigbury & Ringmore News, this edition of the magazine has been very professionally 'guest edited' by fifteen year old Matilda Pitt under the guidance of our Editor, Jan Davies. It seemed fitting to dedicate 'Business Matters' to our young upcoming entrepreneurs who may choose to venture into the world of business and would like a brief insight into some of the components that help to engage effective two way communication. The way we communicate not only applies to the world of business but in every aspect of our daily lives. It's good to be reminded from time to time how best to communicate to try and achieve the best results. Some of this information has been taken from BBC Bitesize which is an excellent resource.

Communication is the process of sending and receiving information from one person to another using a channel of communication. Internal communication consists of messages that are sent between people or groups that work for the same business. External communication refers to messages that are sent to people who do not work within the business. Depending on the information that is being shared and the audience that the message is being sent to, communication can be formal or informal:-

- Letter a formal written document that is usually word-processed and sent via the post or attached electronically to an email.
- Email a formal or informal written document that is used to communicate internally and externally with a range of stakeholders.
- Text message a brief written message used both internally and externally.
- Phone conversation a verbal means of communication used internally and externally.
- Meeting a formal or informal gathering of people to exchange information verbally.
- Meetings may be conducted face to face or through web or video conference facilities.
- Presentation a formal method of verbally communicating information to a group of people.
- · Video businesses may make videos to communicate information formally to employees.
- Social media a formal or informal way of sharing information with a wide audience.
- Website a formal way of communicating with a wide audience.

Being able to communicate effectively is vital for any business. Sometimes barriers prevent a message from being received, which causes poor communication and can have negative impacts. As feedback is an important part of communication, I asked Matilda to share with us her top tip based on her experience with us.



#### Matilda's top tip...

Find out the best way that people would like to be communicated with so you get maximum engagement and good communication from both sides.



Always try to find out some information about the business or person that you are talking to. It shows that you've done your research and homework & that you are interested. It will make a good impression and is a good way of breaking the ice!

#### The Peoples Voice

96% of the many hundreds who voted agreed with the following statements that should inform the Devon Rivers Manifesto. Results can be found on our website: www.avon-river-champions.org

- 1. Devon Rivers to be of overall good Ecological Status by 2030
- 2. Southwest Water to ensure sewage treatment and wastewater works have adequate hydraulic capacity as specified in their Discharge Permits before paying dividends & bonuses.
- 3. Environment Agency budgets restored with powerful mandate to monitor frequently and in detail to ensure Agriculture and Southwest Water comply with legislation that protects our rivers.
- 4. Water Companies to be made Public Benefit Corporations to environmentally sensitive corporate social responsibility.



- 5. Fund farmers to reduce Agricultural Runoff by installing nature-based solutions, adequate covered slurry tanks, slurry soil injectors, slurry processing into energy or less soluble organic fertilisers, transition to regenerative farming, diversification.
- 6. Planning Authorities empowered and required to control pollution from new developments. Southwest Water to be made a mandatory consultee.
- 7. Local budgets for road drainage adequately funded to prevent pollution of rivers and farmland.
- 8. Environment Agency to produce annual catchment reports of key data in easy-to-read format to restore public confidence in their ability to protect our rivers.

We have championed local suppliers, with the Planet Local campaign in Holywell Stores and the small eco-steps taken by individuals in Bigbury & Ringmore News. We will continue to do this – as "every little really does help".



There is now a definite movement in the right direction as more as more people are switching to renewable energy, undertaking whole house surveys and our parish council has adopted a Climate & Biodiversity Action Policy. We have all got a lot to be proud of.



Bigbury has a great sense of community and can be proud of the many fun activities that, together, they have designed and supported as a team effort to draw attention to serious issues such as climate change and biodiversity loss. Everyone remembers the exciting Beach Assemblies and the Island Assembly when global governments were deliberating next steps during the international COP. National and local press coverage of these events has inspired action beyond our little parish boundaries. How cool is that?



We have come together to celebrate nature and take action to improve habitats and reduce our use of fossil fuels. We have risen to the global challenge and undertaken many research projects from thermal imaging surveys, energy forums, historic changes in land use, to the more complex issues of how to help the parish achieve carbon neutrality by sharing the work in the Small Farm Offset Scheme. Many homes, all our farms and businesses have now measured their carbon footprints and are working out what makes sense for them. Difficult times ahead and rubbish weather but Bigbury is making a plan - no heads in the sand here!



Our joint efforts have been noticed by organisations in Devon tasked to drive down the Devon County footprint and our next big project is likely to be led by Regen, funded by Innovate UK. If the Regen funding bid is successful we will benefit from a team of professionals who will undertake feasibility studies on heat networks in Bigbury supplying cheap energy from a large ground-sourced heat pump system and an EV charging station powered by re-used vegetable oil. Fingers crossed.

Born in London, Matthew has come from a Hotel and Hospitality background, working all over the UK. Matthew has been fortunate enough to work in a number of high-end, red starred and rosetted Country House Hotels. More recently moving around the Southwest until he finally settled in Plymouth, Devon. Why Devon? "Simple - its spectacular views, moors and coastline". Working his way up the career ladder from catering to management, Matthew has been a keen, hands-on manager. His love for people, passion for projects and helping establishments reach their full potential drives him on.

Matthew is new to Golf and therefore Golf Club Course management, but with his wealth of knowledge from his previous life, he is confident that the skills and lessons from his time in hospitality are transferable. Matthew talks enthusiastically about ideas and an alternative way to approach problems, which he describes as opportunities. He believes that he has a different perspective and therefore lot to offer to the role.

The course has the most incredible views, it has got one of the best locations in the UK, "even if we do get 4 seasons in one day!" During Matthew's first week, Bigbury had the honour of hosting England's Golf Race to Woodhall Spa, a prestigious event with competitors coming from across the UK. The positive feedback about the course has been relentless, both visitors and members alike seem to have nothing but positive comments. Even being a man down on the course, the greens team led by Richard has done a fabulous job, producing "the best greens I've played on this year". Dealing with the wet weather earlier in the year of course brought problems of its own.

Along with Richard, Head Green Keeper, Andrea the Office Manager has been invaluable in his first few weeks at the Club. "I have been incredibly lucky to inherit an amazing team, they have been very supportive of my ideas." Being from a catering background and having a sweet tooth, Matthew knows his cakes! Maggs the Catering Manager (and creator of all things homemade and delicious) has continued delivering her fabulous array of cakes, as they are mid-season, they haven't made any changes to the menu but they have now also introduced a daily Specials Board offering additional fresh homemade creations to those on the course or just visiting.

One thing that surprises Matthew is that the 1980 perception of golf courses still being stuffy, and exclusive clubs still exist. For any business to survive it cannot rely on one source of income, it needs to do everything it can to open up to any opportunities. The opportunities that Bigbury offers were what interested Matthew in the position initially and he is open-minded, ready to get the golf club reaching its full potential.

As the manager, Matthew has many new ideas to introduce at the golf course to improve the offering to the golfers and he is also keen to put the club on the map for the local community. One of his aims is to make the business a year-round business giving staff all-year-round employment, where locals can pop in, meet and treat themselves to coffee with one of Maggs' freshly baked cakes. He has also brought back (by popular demand) the Takeaway Fish and Chips, while enjoying golf in the fresh summer air. Matthew wants to encourage all locals to use the club more as a communal area to eat, drink, spend time with friends and play some golf. He is big on removing the stigma that the club is just for members only and remind the community that they are all welcome to enjoy the views and relax at the club, with or without a membership.

The golf club has done lots over the years to maintain a clean, safe environment in the local community, winning the sustainability project of the year award in 2023. Matthew is passionate about continuing previous efforts to help the environment. One initiative that he is keen to continue is to plant an new tree for every new member. Planting trees over the last few years has been part of the sustainability has become a big part of the club, with hundreds of trees planted as well as large wild flower beds. They are currently talking to the South Hams Planning department about putting in solar panels to supply a large proportion of the golf club's energy. Once they receive permission, they will add at least two Electric Vehicle chargers that members and visitors alike can make use of.

Overall, Matthew wishes to make the golf club more accessible to everyone in the community including junior golfers, parents and of course lady golfers, Matthew is ready to explore fresh ideas and get the community involved in promoting the golf club, so the establishment can thrive and the locals can enjoy it even in the darker winter months.

# Bigbury Golf Club



Sustainable, environmental and bio-diversity are all very much part of modern-day life and thinking. Is it achievable, or is it just for those with a big advertising budget that love trendy buzz words? What does it actually mean and how does it affect the business!

Well, for the last 5 years here at Bigbury Golf Club we have been rolling out a strategy towards the goal of Net zero! Bigbury and most of the South Hams are listed in the area of outstanding natural beauty, which covers most of the region. Although we rent part of Bantham Estate, we are independently ran and owned by our Golf Club members. Sustainability at the Club is very much a two edged sword, where doing the right thing isn't always cost effective or indeed financially viable. In 2019 the Board of Directors at the Club decided to set up a working committee to explore what we as a Club could do to make a difference.

Highlighted in their first meeting were many ideas great and small. The smaller projects involved simple actions that could easily be achieved with little cost and impact to the business. Where possible light switches were swapped to sensor switch, light bulbs changed to LEDs, and the heating and hot water was set to a minimum with a view to boosting when necessary. Following the success of these small but significant improvements, a strategy was born with a number of key objectives, which could be put in action with a little help!

One area of improvement involved working with The Devon Wildlife Trust. Following a site visit, areas around the edge of the course were ear marked to be left as set aside. These are areas where habitat is left to its natural devices.

A further eight areas were identified where wildflower seeds would be sown, along with additional areas for planting whips and larger more established trees. This project was supported with sponsorship and individual donation by members. With the continued help from The Devon Wildlife Trust we were also able to place nesting boxes in suitable spots around the course.

The word chemicals is not a word you wish to see alongside the word environment. A thorough review of chemicals used on the Course as well as in the Clubhouse was carried out and actioned. This involved looking for alternatives which were kind to the planet.

At the start of 2023, our Centenary Year, the Board of Directors pledged to plant a new tree for every new member that joined the Club during that year. Over 130 trees were pledged due to new members coming to the Club.

The sad closure of Wrangaton Golf Club had seen a large influx of new members at Bigbury which made this such a great achievement. In recent years almost 900 had been planted taking our total to well over 1000 trees to date.

Significant changes have taken place at Bigbury Golf Club and we are delighted with our achievements. One of our highlights of 2023 was attending an awards evening at Hilton Manchester. Having been nominated for the England Golf Sustainability Award, six of our staff and Board members made their way to Manchester. This presentation evening is where England Golf announced that Bigbury Golf Club had won their Sustainability Award. You can't imagine the immense pride and excitement when this was announced by Clare Balding their host!


As time rolled on, the working committee were aware there were bigger opportunities. It became more evident we needed a future plan for our course machinery and installation of solar panels could significantly reduce our carbon footprint. The committee explored the options for migrating our fossil fuelled greenkeeping equipment to environmentally friendly alternatives. During 2023 we applied and were granted permission to install solar panels on the roof of the Greenkeepers shed. Another exciting decision was made to buy our first piece of battery operated machinery which runs on solar energy.

Also during 2023 we presented our planning application to obtain permission for solar panels to service the Clubhouse, this is still work in progress with SHDC. Electric Vehicle charging points are also high on our list. A substantial proportion of the Clubhouse power will be provided by the solar panels and will give additional power to enable us to install Electric Vehicle charging points for the community and visitors.


